Dame Julia Cleverdon DCVO, CBE is a passionate and practical campaigner who has gained an international reputation for 'connecting the unconnected', inspiring individuals and organisations to work together for the common good in the most challenged communities.

During her tenure as Chief Executive of Business in the Community from 1991 to 2007, Julia worked closely with the President HRH The Prince of Wales in building a movement of 850 member companies. Julia later served as Special Adviser to The Prince's Charities and focused efforts on disadvantaged communities.

Julia co-founded Step Up To Serve (#iwill), a campaign which was set up to make meaningful social action a part of life for young people across the UK. As Chair of Teach First from 2007 to 2014, and now Vice Patron, Julia has pioneered efforts to address educational disadvantage. She serves on the Careers and Enterprise Company and Youth Futures Foundation boards, is Deputy Chair of the Fair Education Alliance, and has just stepped down as Chair of the National Literacy Trust. Julia also chairs Transform Society, which aims to inspire a generation towards public service. She is Patron of Right to Succeed and chairs Place Matters.

Saeed Atcha MBE DL is an inspiring CEO, Leader and Changemaker having worked to make the world a better place for all young people, for a decade.

Having grown up in care, Saeed is acutely aware of how young people from disadvantaged backgrounds can be overlooked when it comes to learning valuable life skills and having a voice in their future. That's why, at the age of 15, he set up Youth Leads UK which has supported more than 12,500 disadvantaged young Greater Mancunians to access volunteering opportunities and skills development programmes.

As well as being a Former Government Social Mobility Commissioner with special responsibility for young people and vulnerable groups, Saeed is a trustee of youth employment charity Generation: You Employed, UK, a Non-Executive Director at social housing group Bolton at Home, an Associate Non-Executive Director at Pennine Care NHS Foundation Trust, an Advisory Council

Member to the Care Tech Foundation and Vice-Chair of Governors at his former secondary school, Ladybridge High School in Bolton.

Saeed was the youngest person on Her Majesty the Queen's New Year's Honours List in 2019 awarded an MBE for services to young people and community in Greater Manchester.

Later that year, Saeed went on to becoming the youngest person ever to be appointed a Deputy Lieutenant of Greater Manchester, a role he'll use to connect more young people to the Crown, raise aspirations and support voluntary groups.

Marcellus Baz BEM has been the founder and chairperson of Nottingham School of Boxing and Switch Up CIC since September 2014. Baz comes from one of the most deprived neighbourhoods in the UK and as a young person was a member of one of the most violent gangs in Nottingham. While trying to get out of the life of crime by training to become a boxer, he was a victim of a machete attack which ended his career.

Baz was then supported by his coach and peers in the boxing gym which helped turn him towards voluntary work, coaching and youth work qualifications and even working in the Nottingham City Youth Offending Service. He focused on working with young people who were at risk of getting involved in or already part of gangs and crime and supporting them to change their life.

Marcellus Baz BEM is widely recognised for his humanitarian work in the UK and Europe (Norway and Denmark) and has received various local, regional and national awards including, BBC Sports Personality Unsung Hero Award 2016. He was also given a British Empire Medal (BEM) by the Queen in December 2016.



Adam Hawksbee is the Deputy Director and Head of Levelling Up at Onward. He was previously Head of Policy at the West Midlands Combined Authority, working with Mayor Andy Street to shape and deliver programmes on housing, transport, skills, and economic development.
